Parasite Advisory Day

The annual Parasite Advisory Day is Wednesday 24th October, the day before our conference. It is being held at AgResearch Grasslands, Palmerston North.

The focus is on cattle and diagnostics the latter being a complex issue with cattle, especially older cattle.

Greg Mirams from Techion is speaking about his new system. It will be good to see some data around the validation of this.

Targeted Selective Treatments

TST's have been shown to work well in young cattle & there is NZ & overseas research on their use in lambs. As anthelmintic resistance becomes more severe TST's may well become the default option. They will require simple, quick & affordable weighing systems linked to modems which give a quick yes/no answer to the question "do I drench this lamb/calf/deer". Come along to PAD ready to debate the need & implementation for this technology. There are other sessions still being planned. PAD is always a good opportunity to discuss current issues & problems you face in your day to day work. So I would encourage you all to add this day onto your conference attendance. The cost for this years PAD is still to be confirmed but it is expected to be around \$100.

I grew up in the Waikato and graduated from Waikato University. I have worked in the animal health industry for 20 years across New Zealand and Australia, focused mainly on veterinary microbiology and parasitology. I am currently working at Invetus NZ, which is part of an Australasian veterinary contract research organisation. I enjoy the combination of field work and laboratory activities. My interests include helping to encourage regular worm monitoring as part of effective livestock management and in supporting a holistic approach to farming that gives our animals the best chance to be happy, healthy and productive.

I started mixed clinical veterinary practice in Waipukurau then moved to VetServices HB (via spell in dairy practice in Dannevirke), to continue development of both small and large animal skills. The opportunity arose to look after the



faecal egg counting programme at VSHB which stimulated a deepening of my parasitology knowledge, along with regular conducting of FECRT trials.

Several years on, the opportunity for another move arose...to Wanaka, Otago. My focus fell firmly into deer, sheep and beef clinical work, with an emphasis on the practicalities of parasite management in an area with a fascinating mix of dry high country and irrigated flats. I continued building knowledge, gaining membership of the ANZCVS in Sheep Medicine, as well as fostering relationships within the agricultural industry.

Recently, another opportunity arose to join a team with a large interest in parasitology in NZ: Boehringer Ingelheim (formerly Merial), as a technical services vet for livestock (with a focus on sheep and beef, across the whole of NZ). Like most (if not all) vets in New Zealand I see our vocation as being the use of evidence-based knowledge, directed by clinical reasoning, to solve practical problems for our clients. My latest role is another extension of this: a further chance to communicate in two-way conversations with farmers, ag professionals, vets, specialists, and researchers, to reach practical working solutions to parasitology problems.
